COMPANY M. MAN KILLED IN BATTLE

Private Smith Ballard Died in Action in France July Twentieth.

Private Smith F. Ballard, of Salem Company M, was killed in action July 20, according to a telegram received by his sister, Mrs. Iona Sheldon on rural route 9, Salem. The telegram read: 'Deeply regret to inform you that Private Smith F. Ballard, infantry, is officially reported as killed in action July 20.'

Captain Keizer Killed.

Captain Phil J. Keizer, a former resident of Salem, was killed in France July 15, according to a telegram received today by Mrs. Harry J. Wendroth, who is a sister of Captain Keizer. He was with the 30th engineers, gas and flame regiment and enlisted in the medical service shortly after the declaration of war. He was a student of the medical college of Willamette University and completed his studies in Portland. After graduation he practiced his profession at Marshfield from which city he enlisted. Capt. Keizer was well known in Salem. During his student life here he was a member of the Salem band.
