State House Notes

Resolutions of appreciation and condolence have been passed by the state board of control in connection with the death of four of the state's employees within the last few weeks. The four were E. T. Moore, superintendent of the state school for the blind; A. E. Strang, chief engineer at the Oregon State Hospital; Fred W. Hendley, chief bookkeeper at the Eastern Oregon State Hospital; and C. M. Wiley, head of the poultry department of the Oregon State hospital.

Loss of \$634,415 was caused in Oregon during the month of August by 45 fires, according to a report issued by State Fire Marshal Wells. The greatest loss was caused by eight fires of unknown origin, this loss totaling \$447,000. Six fires of incendiary and suspicious origin caused a loss of \$40,000.

Four of the fires resulted in the death of five children and injured three, other persons. The biggest fire during the month occurred at Rainier, where a sawmill and a door factory burned, burning a loss of \$400,000. Hay crops burned at Lakeview resulted in a loss of \$100,000.

With the resignation of State Senator George R. Wilbur of Hood River and Wasco counties, which has been filed at the general election in November. Candidates may be nominated for the place by an assembly of 100 or more electors, or more, or by petition of three per cent of the voters of the district. The time for filing nominations made by assembly expires September 19 and by petition September 25. Central committees of political parties cannot name candidates unless the vacancy is caused by the death of the official or his removal from the district.

A. W. Lafferty of Portland, filed with Secretary of State Olcott Thursday afternoon his certificate of nomination as an independent candidate for representative in congress from the third district, comprised of Multnomah county. The nomination is made by petition, which contains 1654 names. Under the law 1605 names are required.

Articles of incorporation have been filed for the Oak Leaf Farm of Oregon, Washington county. The corporation has a capital stock of \$10,000. The incorporators are B. A. Mitchell, Allen M. McDonald and R. E. Parsons.

The U. S. Lumber company of Portland, with a capital stock of \$50,000, filed its articles. The incorporators are J. G. Kilgore, John R. Westervelt and O. A. Neal.

Forty-Four Thousand Oregon Men in War

Exclusive of 44,000 men in military service, there are 219,200 men 18 years and over engaged in gainful occupations in Oregon, according to figures compiled by Labor Commissioner Hoff, for his biennial report.

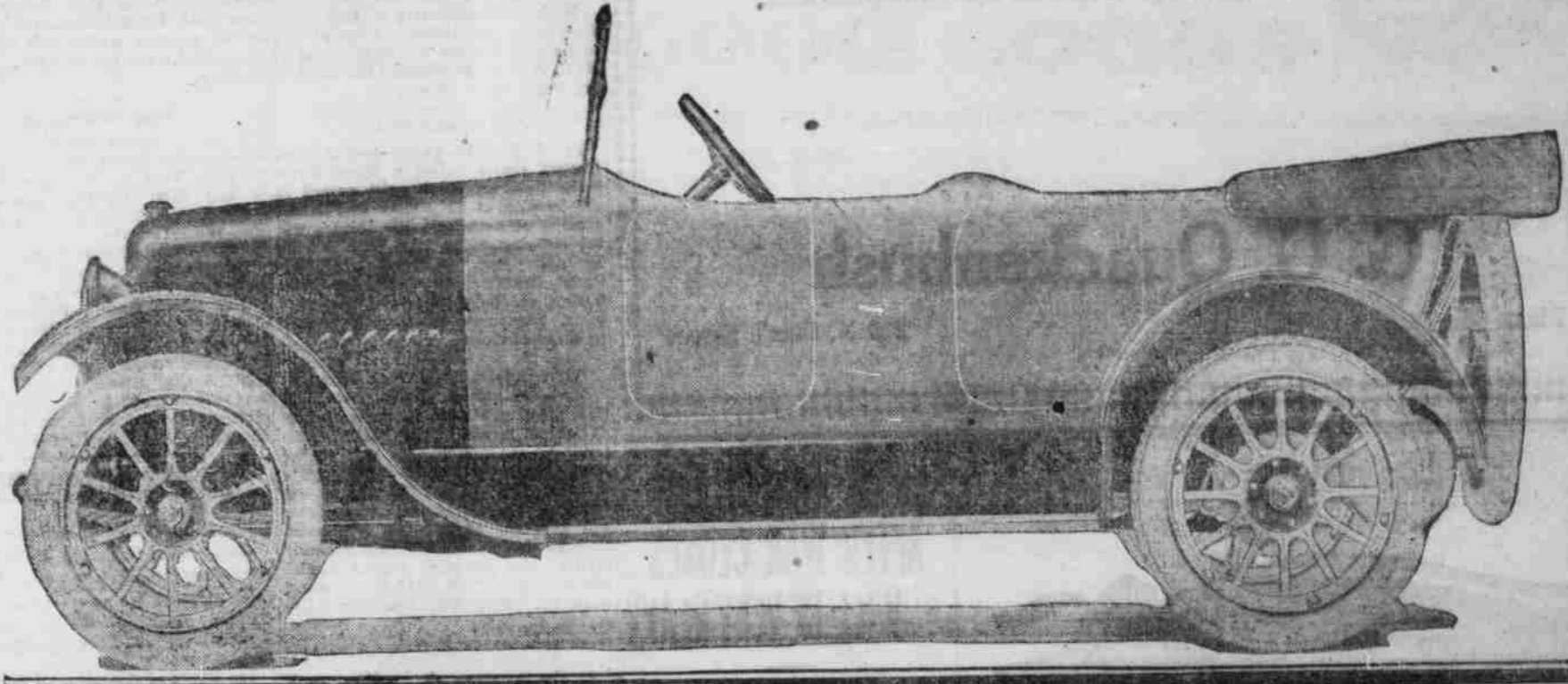
Males 10 years or over engaged in gainful occupations number 368,000, including 44,000 in military service. This is an increase of over 100,000 since 1910. These figures show there are 111,800 boys between ages of 10 and 18 who are usefully employed in Oregon.

These workers of the present time are segregated as follows: Military service, 44,000; agriculture, forestry and animal industry, 98,000; extraction of minerals, 1,000; transportation, 28,000; manufacturing and mechanical industries, 130,000; trade, 30,000; public service, 4,000; professional service, 5,000; domestic and personal service, 11,000; clerical occupations 4,000.

A comparison of deposits in the state banks in western Oregon with those in eastern Oregon is made in a statement issued by the state banking department. The comparison is based on the deposits

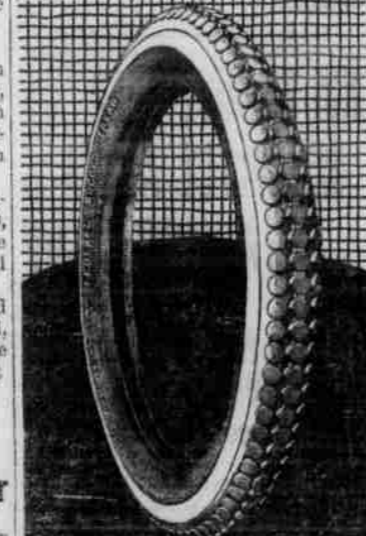
Allies Will Purchase Large Amount of Prunes

Before a county court can exercise such functions a law must be passed giving it authority, points out the attorney general.

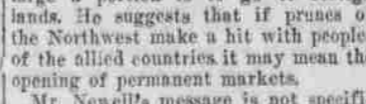
