July 13, 1917, to July 15, 1918, retail food prices for all the articles combined increased 15%. Between June 13, 1918, and July 15, 1918, twenty-two essential food articles increased 3%. For the five year period from July 15, 1913, to July 15, 1918, all food combined showed an increase in price of 69%.

SALEM REGISTERED 1188 SOLDIERS

Estimated That The Number Of Registrants in County Will Total 2900.

Salem men to the number of 1188 stepped up to the 18 registering booths yesterday and enrolled as possible U. S. soldiers.

- No. 1, Prescott's barber shop, 105. In this precinct four of the registrants had passed their 45th birthday. No. 2, Bungalow Christian church, 62, none over the age of 45. No. 3, Cameron's paint shop, 68. Four men were over the age of 45. No. 4, Ruble's store building, 51 with but one man over 45. No. 5, Richmond school, 55, with three men having passed their 45th birthday. No. 6, Yew Park school, 28, with but one man over 45. No. 7, Highland school, 31, with four men more than 45 years of age. No. 8, Reddaway's building, 62, with three men over 45. No. 9, Capital street garage, 50 with two registrants more than 45 years of age. No. 10, Garfield school, 55, with but two over the age of 45. No. 11, Court house in Salem, 217, registrants, with 279 more registering from boards outside of the city of Salem. No. 12, Mill and 12th streets, 55, with four men over the age of 45. No. 13, at 945 south 12th street, 27, registrants. No. 14, Wyant school, 240 River street, 34, with three having passed their 45th birthday. No. 15, Baptist church, 77, with five men having celebrated their 45th birthday. No. 16, City hall, 44, with two men over 45. No. 17, Marion hotel sample room, 86 with five men registered who had passed their 45th birthday. No. 18, Friends church south Salem, 71, with three placing their age at 45 years.

Reports at noon today gave the following registrants: East Stayton 53; Croisan 36; Stayton 40; Sidney 41; Central Howell 41; Rosedale 78; South Silvertown 54; East Salem 33; Fairground, 68; Salem Heights 33; Englewood 42; Pringle 31; Melama 31; Shaw 26; Turner 26; Marion 30; Jefferson 93; Sublimity 67; Liberty 26; Riverview 43; Chomawa 56; Victor Point 41 and Mill City 89. The largest number of registrants were from the ages of 18 to 21. Beginning with the age of 32 years, the number of registrants for each year inclusive of 45 runs about the same. That is, no special age seems to have more registrants than others.
