sado; Francis sought in vain of Zal-kind, who was acting as foreign minister in the absence of Trotsky again at Brest for an extension of the time of departure.

Diamandi's Arrest Ordered.
Following the letter from Joffe at Brest-Litovsk carrying General Hoffman's order through Trotsky to incite

agitation against the Roumanian army and to arrest Diamandi, the Roumanian Minister:

Brest-Litovsk, Dec. 31, 1917. — No. 365, N. K.—Commissioner Shitkevitch: Take copies and send to the Commission for Foreign Affairs, personally to Commissioner Zalkind.

To the Council of National Commissars: comrade L. D. Trotsky has charged me to bring to the knowledge of the Council of National Commissars the motives for his telegraphic proposal to arrest the Roumanian diplomatic representatives in Petersburg.

General Hoffman, referring to the conference which had taken place in Brest-Litovsk between the members of the German and Austro-Hungarian delegations on December 29, presented to the Roumanian delegation in the name of the German and Austrian chief command (a deciphered radiotelegram was exhibited in this connection) a confidential incitement of the Roumanian army to recognize the necessity of an armistice.

After this interview Commander L. D. Trotsky by cable proposed to arrest the Roumanian Mission in Petersburg with all its members. This report is being sent by special courier—Comrade L. G. Brossoff—who has to personally transmit to Commissary Polvoisky some information of a secret character regarding the sending to the Roumanian army of those persons whose names Commander Brossoff will give. (Note—Undersecretary marked "To Sander.") All these persons will be paid out of the cash of the "German Naptha-Industrial Bank" which has bought near Boreaslavi the business of the joint stock company of Fanto & Co. The chief direction of those agents has been entrusted, according to General Hoffman's indication, to a certain Von Vonig (Note—Von Igel), who is keeping a watch over the military agents of the countries allied with us. As regards the English and American diplomatic representatives, General Hoffman has expressed the agreement of the German staff to the measures adopted by Commander Trotsky and Commander Lazimiroff with regard to watching over their activity.—Member of the delegation, A. Yoffe.

Tuesday Will Be Dairy Day At The State Fair

Dairy Day this year has special significance in that the Food Administration is making a special plea to the people of the United States to use more milk.

The dairy herds of Europe are greatly depleted. The soldier, the sailor, the

Belgian refugees, the people of France need milk and other dairy products. They look to the United States to supply them. How can America help them? It is going to allow her own dairy herds to be slaughtered.

The dairymen are called upon to keep their herds intact even if it means financial loss. They are asked to allow her milk to be used for food. They will do it, and will reward in many dollars of profit the seasons to come, for the dairy is and must always be one of the nation's greatest assets. Even if it is high now the dairymen who are sighted will keep their cows and feed them to his best ability. He knows if he is wise, that milk is the most valuable of foods. In sections where milk is not used the health of the herd is bad. They get rickets, pleurisy and tuberculosis.

Oregon's health rate is high and rate of infant mortality is low. Cutting down the milk supply is going to spoil all that.

Dr. E. J. Labbe, who is a specialist of renown and who has recently returned from France, will speak at a dairy industries and for milk as a dairy industry. He will talk on the dairy industry in France and Switzerland where many war sufferers and captives were fed many war sufferers and captives. His address will be Tuesday night, September 24 at 8 o'clock in the evening. Housewives, business men, students, doctors, nurses, farmers, domestic science teachers, farm dairymen, all should hear Dr. Labbe.
