The quota for Willamette chapter is 7 1/2 tons and it is thought that at least five tons should be contributed from Salem and vicinity.

If any household has been missed in the collection of clothing, it is urged that notice of this should be telephoned to Red Cross headquarters, No. 1500. In such cases, an auto will call for the package.

Attorney Ernest Blue Declared Not Guilty

Not guilty was the verdict returned in the case of the state of Oregon against Ernest Blue.

For several years Blue was attorney for the city of West Salem and in the spring of 1916 left Salem going to Ketchikan, Alaska. Later the city put an expert accountant on the books and there was found according to his figures a shortage of more than two thousand dollars.

Blue was arrested in Alaska but was out on \$5000 bond. His trial last week occupied four days of the time of the circuit court. It seems that the books of the corporation of West Salem were kept in such an unbusinesslike way during those years that it was difficult for the prosecution to fix specific instances where Blue converted the city's money to his own use.

Blue made a good witness for himself, claiming that he had not been properly credited with several amounts. The prosecution based its case almost entirely on the testimony of the ex-

Army Cargo Vessel Sunk By Submarine

Washington, Sept. 23.—The U. S. S. Boena Ventura, an army cargo vessel of 4876 tons was torpedoed and sunk off the coast of Spain, the navy department announced today. Twenty men are still unaccounted for. Six officers and thirty nine men have been landed at Brest by a French destroyer and two officers and twenty seven men have been landed at Corona, Spain.

The attack was made on September 20 at 8:25 p. m., the vessel sinking six minutes later. Latest figures available have placed the total number on board at 95. Nothing was seen of the submarine before the attack but it emerged after the ship went down. The report received at the navy department described the U-boat as being 450 feet long and carrying two guns.
