MRS. WALLACE DIES IN EASTERN HOSPITAL

Prominent Salem Woman Fails of Rally From Recent Operation.

Mrs. R. S. Wallace, prominent in all church and social welfare work in the city died Monday evening at a hospital in Sewickley, Pa., according to word received in the city last night. Death followed an operation for obstruction of the bowels.

About four weeks ago Mrs. Wallace went east to visit her sister, Mrs. R. Trimble, at Sewickley and her daughter, Mrs. W. S. Lambie, of Schenectady, N. Y. A telegram to friends in Salem last week announced that she had been taken to a hospital and that she had successfully withstood the operation.

Mrs. Wallace was chairman of the physical department of the Y. W. C. A. and a member of the board. She gave much of her time to the work of the Red Cross and in personally caring for invalids and in helping those in need of assistance.

Avery Brundage Is Again World's Champion

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Avery Brundage Chicago Athletic association, today held for the third time the title of national all round champion. In the final ten events of the national A. A. U. meet here, Brundage scored 6,708.5 out of a possible 10,000. He won only two events, but held a high average in all. He held the same title in 1914 and 1916. J. Hellum, Pastime A. C. New York, took second honors; E. J. Thompson, Royal Air Forces, Toronto, was third.



THE ALLIED WESTERN SWEEP THROUGH SIBERIA—THE ALLIED FORCES IN RUSSIA ARE NOW ADVANCING STEADILY BREAKING IN THE resistance of the Bolsheviki on six fronts. (1) Chinese and Japanese units advancing across Manchuria in the direction of arrow. (2) aiming to gain full control of the Trans-Siberian Railroad. Mixer allied forces on the Usurie front arrow (3) have advanced about 20 miles down the river. Czechoslovaks are marching eastward along the Trans-Siberian railroad in the direction of arrow (4) to meet their allies in the region of Irkutsk. Recent dispatches have failed to report further advances of the allied landing forces on the Kola and Archangel fronts arrow (5) or of the British in Turkestan arrow (6).

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
