ian frontier, on a front of about 37 miles, extending from the little village of Stroumitza, on the east bank of the Vardar in Serbia to the vicinity of Malnitza, east of Lake Doiran in the Greek territory. Allied cavalry was reported yesterday to be advancing toward the Bulgarian city of Stroumitza, only ten miles northeast of the village of the same name and six miles inside the Bulgarian border. The allied line now extends north of Lake Doiran and large bridgehead, have been seized on the east bank of the Vardar extending as far north as the confluence of the Vardar and Cerna.

low grade cotton are responsible for the instability in prices.

The government's requirements also are for the higher grades of cotton and Baruch expects the Brand committee to force the lower grade cotton on the market for civilian use. This will bring up the price of lower grade cotton which is now being held awaiting higher prices. The effect of this Baruch says, should also be the lowering of the prices on higher grade cotton. He thinks also that this will meet both the government and civilian demands. The only result that would result from price fixing would be to get all the cotton available on the market, he said.

The question of stimulating production is causing no alarm, since the planters are producing all they can, he added.

The following statement was authorized by the chairman of the cotton committee today:

"The committee on cotton distribution will establish offices immediately.

"The committee plans to exercise supervision through existing customary channels by controlling the quantity and quality of cotton used by domestic and foreign customers.

"This, they believe, can be done without disturbing to any appreciable extent the existing facilities and organization for marketing and distributing the crop.

"The committee will require both domestic and foreign consumers to take an equitable proportion of the grade below middlings."

ture archbishop found a playmate in Thomas O'Gorman now Bishop of Sioux Falls, S. D.

The two were marked by Bishop Cretin, famed French missionary, who sent them to France to study for the priesthood. While studying, Ireland met and accepted his model, Father Cheverson, French priest who later became bishop of Boston. Ireland was ordained December 21, 1861.

He returned to America when the civil war broke out and enlisted in the Union army. Rated as a chaplain, Ireland bunked, ate and fought with the privates, securing better accommodations offered with the officers.

Archbishop Ireland was a close friend of the late James J. Hill, his work with the church fitting in with the colonizing labors of the railroad magnate. He was also firm friend of Presidents McKinley and Roosevelt. Under Roosevelt's administration he settled the Philippine friar land controversy.

He was responsible for the founding of the Catholic university at Washington, D. C., appearing before the Pope to show why such an institution should be established.

**THE AUSTRIAN REPORT.**  
Vienna, via London, Sept. 24.—Delayed)—Repulse of allied attacks in various sectors of the Italian front, together with artillery and patrol activity was reported by the Austrian war office today.

French and Italian troops penetrated the Austrian lines near Mont Seismol, but were driven out by a counter attack, the statement said. Artillery fighting was particularly lively in the southern Tyrol area.
