Notice is hereby given that subject to the conditions and limitations of the act of June 9, 1915 (39 Stat., 218) and the instructions of the secretary of the interior of September 15, 1917, the timber on the following lands will be sold October 23, 1918, at 10 o'clock a. m., at public auction at the United States land office at Portland, Oregon, to the highest bidder at not less than the appraised value as shown by this notice, sale to be subject to the approval of the secretary of the interior. The purchase price, with an additional sum of one fifth of one per cent thereof, being commissions allowed, must be deposited at time of sale, money to be returned if sale is not approved, otherwise patent will issue for the timber which must be removed within ten years. Bids will be received from citizens of the United States, associations of such citizens and corporations organized under the laws of the United States or any state, territory or district thereof only. Upon application of a qualified purchaser, the timber on any legal subdivision will be offered separately before being included in any offer of a larger unit.

North Portland, Sept. 25.—With a limited number of live stock at the North Portland Stock Yards over night trading is active and prices are ruling steady to strong. The count in the different divisions is 200 cattle, 300 hogs and 100 sheep and lambs which find ready sales at today's quotations. Yesterday's receipts totaled 1100 cattle, 150 calves, 1170 hogs and 1050 sheep.

Captured German Guns
And Other Trophies
Prizes For Filling Quotas

Washington, Sept. 25.—Captured German guns and other war trophies will grace the public squares of those cities and villages which win prizes in going over the lines in the coming liberty loan campaign. These trophies already have been sent to distributing centers. Today the final instructions were sent out by the treasury department to the local committees and the onrush of the great campaign will start at midnight Friday.

Details of the loan, now complete, shows that the American people called upon to subscribe \$6,000,000,000, must make the greatest financial investment they have ever been urged to place with the government. Treasury officials are confident the loan will be ever subscribed.

President Wilson, Secretary McAdoo and other members of the cabinet are prepared to enter the campaign for millions.

SILVERTON NEWS

Silverton, Ore., Sept. 25.—The funeral of J. M. Morley was held at the W. O. W. hall last Sunday under the auspices of the Woodmen of the World, of which the deceased was a member.

Mr. Morley was born in the Waldo Hills near Silverton in 1861, and has lived in and near Silverton all his life. For a number of years he has been engaged in the confectionery business in this city. His death occurred last Wednesday after a prolonged illness.

"Jack" Morley, as he was commonly called, leaves eight sisters and five brothers, most of them residents of Silverton at the present time. Besides these relatives he leaves a widow and infant son.
