"Under a recent order from the gov-ernment the Oil Companies of the Paernment the Oil Companies of the Pacific coast are ordered to make a certain amount of high-grade gasoline for the Aero Piane use and it is impossible to fill the needs of the government and at the same time turnish to the state of Oregon sufficient amount of gasoline of a specific gravity to meet the requirements of the state law.

"Unless you receive instructions to the contrary you will not prosecute dealers that sell gasoline that does not pass the gasoline gravity test unless you are satisfied that the dealers are mixing distillate with the gasoline and selling the same as gasoline.


