Found Paris An Old Town With Women Doing Work

Mrs. J. G. Reigelman of 940 Mill street, is in receipt of a letter from Perry Reigelman who is now in France in the photo laboratory work of the army.

He writes that 4,000 soldiers were on the ship on which he crossed the Atlantic and that before they reached France, the ship and others were attacked by submarines, but that no one was hurt.

Men in the photographic work are located in an old chateau near Paris about a 15 minute walk from the city. He writes that Paris seems quite an old city and that the streets are very irregular. Military uniforms predominate on the streets of Paris and the women generally wear sombre clothes. Street cars run regularly in Paris but their lights are dimmed. They are operated by boys and children who also do work that was formerly done by men.

It required 11 1/2 days for the troop ship to cross the Atlantic. As soon as soldiers arrive in France, they are sent to barracks built by Napoleon. As the troops march along, the French children sing, "Hail, Hail, the Gang's all Here." He writes that the trip across northern France is a wonderful one.

Low Grade Gasoline May Be Legally Sold

Because of government demands for high grade gasoline for airplane use, Deputy State Senator Wortman is today sending notice to all district sealers not to prosecute dealers who sell gasoline below the standard requirements of the state laws. He says he does not know yet what the specific gravity of the gasoline furnished by the companies will be. His letter to the district sealers says:

"Under a recent order from the government the Oil Companies of the Pacific coast are ordered to make a certain amount of high grade gasoline for the Aero Plane use and it is impossible to fill the needs of the government and at the same time furnish to the state of Oregon sufficient amount of gasoline of a specific gravity to meet the requirements of the state law.

"Unless you receive instructions to the contrary you will not prosecute dealers that sell gasoline that does not pass the gasoline gravity test unless you are satisfied that the dealers are mixing distillate with the gasoline and selling the same as gasoline.

"I will let you know in the near future what the specific gravity of the gasoline furnished by the companies will be."
