### War Summary of United Press

#### 1520th Day of the War; 76th Day of Counter Offensive

**Flanders front**—The British, cooperating with the Belgians, have extended their operations southward until now the offensive front covers about 50 miles in a semi-circle from Dixmude to near LaBassee. The great industrial and transportation center of Lille, as well as the German submarine bases on the coast are menaced by the huge wedge driven into the enemy lines.

**Picardy front**—British, American and French troops continue their steady progress through the Hindenburg defenses on the 50 mile front from south of Douai to near LaPerre. Cambrai is virtually in British hands. St. Quentin has been practically surrounded and LeCateau is now held by the Americans.

**Rheims-Verdun front**—American progress between the Aisne and the Meuse has been slowed up by the tremendous mass of reinforcements flung into battle by the Germans who are desperate-

ly seeking to protect vital communications northwest of Verdun. The French, however, have been able to push forward between the Aisne and the Sambre, carrying their lines north of Mont Hois.

**Oise-Verde front**—Further progress has brought the French within striking distance of both Laon and Craonne. The Chemin-des-Dames is gradually coming under control of the French, who are passing the great St. Gobain massif in a wide, encircling movement to the southward.

**Palestine front**—The British are unofficially reported to be within 2 1/2 miles of the great Turkish city of Damascus. French cavalry is said to be approaching the Mediterranean seaport of Beirut.

**Balkan front**—A great battle is anticipated when the Germans moving into northern Serbia from Rumania,

### SHEPHERD'S DELL TO REMAIN PROPERTY OF MULTNOMAH COUNTY

#### Property Had Been Sold By Sheriff Previous To Deed To The County

Shepherd's Dell, a natural park on the Columbia River Highway, which was given by George Shepperd to Multnomah county for park purposes, will not be lost to the public through a sheriff's deed issued to George Holmes and Emal M. Orth as the supreme court today affirmed the action of Circuit Judge McGinn of Multnomah county in setting aside the deed.

After George Shepperd had donated the property to the county for a park he discovered that it had been conveyed by sheriff's deed to Holmes and Orth, who had instituted attachment proceedings for the collection of three made to attach Shepperd's personal property of small value. No effort was made to attach the real estate which was worth many times the value of the notes.

Without hearing all the testimony Judge McGinn ordered the sheriff's deed set aside, and the supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice Benson said the facts clearly justified the decree of the lower court.

The supreme court reversed the case of Nellie B. Turnidge vs. J. T. Thompson, appellant, appealed from Yamhill county. This suit was for damages for the death of the plaintiff's husband, who was killed by coming in contact with a live electric wire. The court reversed the decree in favor of the plaintiff on the grounds that her husband was neither an employee of the defendant nor engaged in work on or about the wire and therefore the case does not come within the scope of the employer's liability act.

Other opinion, handed down as follows:

E. S. Hayes vs. J. L. Hayes, administrator of estate of Alex Hayes, deceased, et al. appellants; appealed from Linn; suit to enforce alleged oral agreement whereby deceased conveyed plaintiff 50 acres of land; opinion by Justice Burnett; Circuit Judge Bingham affirmed.

**Palmer-Howarth Logging Co. vs. W. G. Henderson, appellant; appealed from Yamhill; action for possession of personal property; opinion by Justice Bean, Circuit Judge Belt reversed and case remanded.**

### School Registration Shows Many Pupils Working in Orchards

The registration of school pupils today shows pretty clearly that a number of students of the higher grades are working to save the fruit crops. It is only in these grades that the attendance so far has fallen off to any extent from that of one year ago.

The attendance as reported today compared with that of the second day of school one year ago is as follows: High school, this year 393, last year 519; Washington junior high, 349 today, one year ago 356; Washington elementary, today 262, last year 191; Grant junior high school, today 123, last year 149; Grant elementary, today 106, one year ago 122; Lincoln junior high school, 118, one year ago 140; Lincoln elementary school, this year 163, last year 145; Park school to-

day 137, one year ago 158; Garfield today 226, last year 236; Richmond, today 120, last year 146; Englewood, today 81, last year 127; Highland, today 120, last year 156.
