Georgia that he cruised around the world in 1907. Hereafter the navy and marine corps will receive their recruits through local exemption boards and men will be drafted for the navy service in all respects similar to that of the army, all through the local boards.

The offices of the Salem Street railway is now displaying the 100 per cent loyalty emblem. Superintendent T. L. Billingsley today announces that the Salem street railway department of the Southern Pacific employs 85 men at Salem, Oregon City and Eugene and that every man has subscribed for the Fourth Liberty Loan, with an average of more than \$100 a man. More than every employe has one or more bonds of every one of the four drives.

A telegram was received this morning by Mrs. James Elvin announcing that her husband, the Rev. James Elvin had arrived safely in New York. Mr. Elvin was formerly pastor of the First Congregational church of this city and is now in the foreign Y. M. C. A. service. He left Salem January 10th and was on duty in France the following month. Mr. Elvin is one of the Y. M. C. A. men who have been permitted to come home to take part in the United Council war drive next month when \$170,000,000 is to be raised for seven organizations. Of this sum the quota for the Y. M. C. A. is \$100,000,000.
