The month also broke all records in

the way of rainfall, with a total of only .17 of an inch. The average rain fall for the month since records have been kept in Salem has been about two inches. In 1903 the precipitation was only 20 of an inch and again in 1908 the month was a dry one with only .30 of an inch. The wettest September of the past 17 years was in 1911 when the precipitation was 4.56 inches. Again in 1914 there was a heavy rainfall, amounting to 4.51 inches. Last year there was 1.32 inches and the year be-

fore, 1.17. Hence the record of the past month is that of the hottest for 17 years and the driest for the same period of time.
