### American Supply Breaks Previous Records

Paris, Oct. 5.—The American supply service established a record in September handling 767,648 tons, at an average of 25,588 tons a day, according to figures made available today. This is ten per cent more than was handled in August.

During the same period 311,909 troops were landed. The rolling stock in American ports here now consists of more than 1000 locomotives and 19,000 cars.

### Prune Situation Still Up In The Air Say Those Interested

The prune situation is still up in the air and according to some of the views expressed by prune men in the city, it seems as if the federal food administration was trying to make it especially hard for prune men in the Willamette valley.

After taking several weeks to figure the loss of prunes in California the food administration finally permitted the packers to ship 30 sizes and larger, and also 90 sizes and smaller. For this prune district, the order was more of a joke than a business proposition, as there is scarcely any prunes of this size on the market. But the order was of benefit to the Clarke county prune growers, as their sizes run extra large this year.

Then a few days ago the food administration issued an order to one of its men in Portland to come to Salem and arrange a system for the inspection of prunes to be shipped to foreign countries. No prunes are to be shipped until inspected and at a meeting held last evening at the Commercial club of several men interested in the prune situation, it was found impossible to arrange for the inspection as provided for by the food administration.

### School Districts Must Pay For The Flag

Any school district that does not fly the national emblem upon or near the school house in the district is violating the state law. There are a few rural school districts that have failed, either through lack of patriotism or ignorance of the law to fly the American flag. The Fern Ridge district east of the city has no flag flying nor has the Silver Creek Falls district so far displayed the National emblem. The school boards that have not as yet provided flags do not comply with the law. The office of the county superintendent of schools will buy for these districts and charge it against them. The state law reads: "The board of directors in the several school districts of this state shall procure a United States flag of suitable size and shall cause said flag to be displayed upon or near the public school building during school hours, except in unsuitable weather, and at such other times as the boards may deem proper."

### Gains at St. Quentin

Paris, Oct. 5.—The French made additional progress north of St. Quentin, northwest of Rheims and in the Champagne yesterday, the war office announced today.

The Germans in the Monts region threatened with envelopment by the Franco-American advance toward the Arnes river, have evacuated the eastern portion of that area.

North of St. Quentin, fighting continued with the same violence," the communique said. "We drove the enemy back, fighting foot by foot, from a height located 1200 meters southwest of Chardon-Vert (adjoining Sequehart on the south), and from the neighboring woods. More prisoners were taken."

Northwest of Rheims we again started a push against the enemy on the whole front of the Aisne canal, which we crossed in several places. We progressed until we reached the border

## FRENCH MAKE GAINS TODAY IN ST. QUENTIN SECTOR

With the British Armies in France, Oct. 4.—(Night)—Smashing of the Beaurevoir-Ponsomme line resulted in a gain of from three to four miles a day compared with gains of three or four hundred yards, which were the best the allies could do in this region just a year ago.

This operation must lead to the time when the allies may advance rapidly, using cavalry freely. A captured German order said the Beaurevoir must be held until the Valenciennes-Givet line is completed.

Australian officers are unable to say enough in praise of the Americans, not only for their gallantry, but their fighting ability. An American officer was found with five empty chambers in his revolver and five dead Germans surrounding him.

The heroes included Rev. Frank Kelly of Albany, who went over the top three times in three days, with his prayer book in his hands.

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## American Indians Go Abroad As Workers For Red Triangle

TWO American Indians have been sent abroad by the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A., one for service with the British troops in Egypt and one to France for work with the Indians with the American Expeditionary Force.

Leander Newton Gansworth, of Davenport, Iowa, volunteered for work with the Indian troops in the American army and is now in France. He was born in Lewiston, N. Y., where his father, two brothers and a sister live. He is a graduate of Carlisle College and is said to be a relative of the famous Red Cloud. Before entering upon Red Triangle work he was financial secretary of the Allied Printing Trades council of Davenport, Rock Island and Moline, and secretary and treasurer of the Review Publishing company of Davenport. He received military, athletic and gymnastic training at Carlisle and after leaving college was a high school football coach for a time.

S. Ralph Wallingstick, of 218 East Colvin street, Syracuse, N. Y., who was sent to Egypt, is a Cherokee Indian. He was born in Tahlequah, Oklahoma where he served as a Y. M. C. A. secretary.
