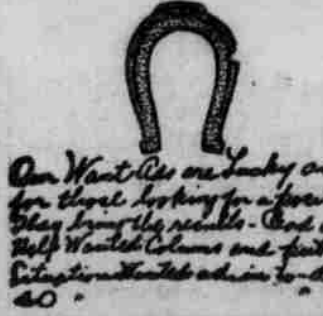

QUICK WORK ON LIBERTY LOAN. Possibly the city which broke the record in going over the top in the recent liberty loan drive was Great Falls, Mont., which raised its entire quota, \$1,200,000 in 14 minutes and in 16 minutes more, had raised an additional \$82,000. This spectacular showing was made by a splendid system of organization by the captains. In the lobby of the largest hotel in the city, booths, which bore the letters of the alphabet were arranged, and when the specified hour came, the subscribers, with money and cards ready, poured into the lobby and gave in their names and the amount of their subscriptions, which were checked off on an adding machine. In precisely 14 minutes from the time the drive opened the allotment for Great Falls which was \$1,200,000 was raised.
