criticized the form, held that the substance of that paragraph showed clearly that there is no disposition to talk peace except on our own terms.

Entente diplomats were plainly relieved at the method the president pursued. They designated this action as a notice to Germany that she must come around to the American-allied view point or be punished into defeat by the onward pressing United States-allied armies.

It has long been an allied condition that evacuation must precede any peace parleys. President Wilson includes that for the first time, and it was said today, he meant evacuation of France, Belgium, Serbia, Italy and Rumania and removal of submarines from the high seas.

Neither the allies nor America will consider any temporary armistice, it was authoritatively stated today.

"We captured Gornay and against stubborn fighting continued our advance in the Argonne forest, East of the Meuse French and American troops, serving with the first army, made a brilliant attack in the vicinity of the Bois Des Cures D'Haumont. The villages of Consenvoye, Brabant Haumont and Beaumont have been occupied and the enemy has been driven well beyond them.

"On both banks of the Meuse our own troops and the French are now pushing the enemy from the scene of the desperate struggle for Verdun. The number of prisoners taken as the result of the day's operations exceeded 3000. Of these, over 1500 were taken by French units east of the Meuse. This brings the total number captured by this command in the last few days to over 4000. The French also captured 18 mortars of 30 calibre and other material."

tack east of the Meuse, which began yesterday, already has released the famous city from the enemy's four year grip.

Fighting over fields which had not been stirred by battles since 1916 the French and Americans have advanced more than two miles on a front of about seven miles.

This operation also has greatly strengthened the right flank of the Americans west of the Meuse. Although heavy rains over the whole front have made the going difficult, pressure against the Kriehilde-Stellung line is increasing all along the line. The German forest are in danger of being shoved back a considerable distance.

**Wheat Crop Of 1917 Was Over Nine Million Bushels**

Washington, Oct. 9.—The indicated wheat crop is 918,920,000 bushels, the war department of agriculture estimated today. The total as given in the final figures for 1917, was 650,828,000 bushels.

An improvement in the corn crop was noted in the report of October 1

which gave the condition 68.6, as against 67.4 a month ago.

The indicated corn crop is 2,717,775,000 bushels, compared with 3,158,494,000 as the final figures for 1917.

A year ago the condition of corn was 75.9. The ten year average for the month is 75.0.

The indicated oats crop is 1,535,297,000, the final for 1917 was 1,587,286,000. The indicated yield a month ago was 1,477,000,000.

The indicated spring wheat yield is 363,195,000. A month ago the indicated yield was about 343,000,000. The 1917 final figure was 232,758,000.

The indicated corn yield per acre October 1, was 23.9 bushels. A month ago the indicated yield per acre was 23.5 bushels. The final for 1917 was 26.4 bushels. The ten year average yield per acre is 26.4.

The indicated yield of spring wheat per acre is 16.1 bushels. The final for 1917 was 12.6 bushels. The ten year average is 13.1 bushels.

The indicated yield of all wheat per acre is 15.6 bushels, compared with a ten year average of 14.7 bushels.
