Passed by the censor. Copyright 1918. "Off with bombs for the Hun." A gripping picture of one of the airplanes we are depending on to carry the war far into Germany ahead of our troops.



"Half on," yells the mechanic at the head end of a huge plane. "Contact clear," repeats the pilot up in the tiny cockpit, and the mechanic twirls the propeller lustily and jumps away.

"Contact," he calls, and the pilot repeats, but his words are drowned as he twirls the handle of a little starting magnet, giving the spark that starts the motor with its deafening roar.

The plane is off for Germany. Loaded with bombs, it dromes away south and east toward Hun munitions works, ammunition stores and railway centers. Far above the aero-

drome it is joined by a couple of fast little scout planes--fighters--for the Hun's won't let this big, slow bomber get away with its deadly mission if they can help it. It has been notable of late that they haven't been able to do tremendously much to prevent it.

When our lines have advanced far enough to make the flights practicable Berlin will come in for what the Huns have tried to give London and Paris, and the war will be carried far and wide over Germany by these planes which drop exploding advance notices of our armies that are coming.
