The following casualties are reported by the commanding general of the American expeditionary forces: Killed in action 47, Missing in action 49, Wounded severely 185, Died of wounds 24, Died of disease 34, Died of accident and other causes 4, Wounded, degree undetermined 136, Wounded slightly 22, Total 501. In today's list, four names are mentioned from Oregon: Arthur B. Howell of Lebanon is reported severely wounded, Wesley H. Allison of Prineville is reported as slightly wounded, Charles G. Ackerman, Florence, Or, died of disease, John W. Stevenson, Baker, Or, died from accident.
