Karl Steiwer and wife, Janet Gray Steiwer, and the land was purchased by Fred W. Swartz. As Lieut. Steiwer is now in France, the deed of transfer was signed by his father, John G. Steiwer as his attorney in fact and Janet G. Steiwer.
