has been expected in congressional circles, acted much like a bomb shell. Republicans could scarcely contain their indignation and resentment. Democrats applauded the statement, declaring it will undoubtedly mean the election of a democratic congress.

Many members withheld comment until they had time to read the president's appear carefully. The comment which was made follows:

Senator Curtis, Kansas (Republican): "It seems to me that the election of the majority of democrats in the house and senate would be a vote of lack of confidence in the prosecution of the war. If a vote of confidence is desired by the administration, he should ask for the election of a republican senate and republican house because the congressional record shows that on all war measures the republicans have been more loyal to the administration than have been the democrats."

Senator Frelinghuysen, New Jersey (Republican): "Politics is adjourned be damned!"

Senator Knook, Pennsylvania (Republican): "I cannot believe that the republicans can be persuaded that the success of the way would be in the slightest degree affected by the results of the next election. To deny otherwise is to deny the fact of history."

Senator Hitchcock, Nebraska (Democrat): "The president has stated the exact facts. He was practically forced to make his appeal by the republican attacks on his policies."

Senator Thomas, Colorado (Democrat): "The president perfectly expressed the view of the democratic majority of the present congress. The republicans have not and will not in any way hamper the conduct of the war. There is no question that they are as loyal as the democrats. But this is no time for divided council."

by the Teutons and nothing else will now satisfy the American people, absolute evacuation of all territory obtained since the commencement of the war. The allied armies will, I hope, continue on the battle field and follow the enemies as they retreat until all their armies, have arrived within their own borders and they lay down their arms, which I am sure President Wilson will require. Then and not until then will an armistice be in order. There is no use in accepting peace in my judgment until these terms are complied with, and the handwriting on the wall indicates that such will be the result at an early date. I hope the allies will make every effort to end forever the rule of the Hohenzollerns in Europe. The present Kaiser is bad and viciously cruel, as we have fully experienced in the last four or five years, but to leave the succession open to his six sons, with the possibility of having six additional Kaisers, would be a serious menace to the world's peace for the next fifty years.

Now that the \$6,000,000,000 loan is out of the way the monetary outlook will probably exhibit some relief. That this unprecedented transaction should be accompanied by comparatively no disturbance is remarkable evidence of the financial strength of the United States. Success has been entirely due to shrewd handling by the government, plus patriotic public support and unparalleled assistance by financial institutions from the Atlantic to the Pacific. It is an achievement that will hearten our soldiers at the front; stiffen allied onslaughts, and convince Germany of our ability and determination to conquer. A large share of this vast sum will as usual be expended at
