**CHAMBERLAIN FOR COMPLETE SURRENDER**

**Chairman Of Military Committee Thinks That Is What Note Means.**

Washington, D. C., Oct. 24.—Senator Chamberlain, chairman of the senate military affairs committee today said: "The president's note may fairly be construed as a diplomatic demand for unconditional surrender, leaving to the military authorities of the allies entirely the adjustment of methods for execution of all occupied territory and arranging for such terms to be imposed upon the conquered as will make it impossible after surrender—for the German government and its allies to again endanger the peace of the world."

"The president very properly serves notice upon military autocracy that he has no confidence in the Kaiser or any of those associated with him, but that if any terms are hereafter agreed upon, that agreement must be with representatives of the people themselves, rather than with those who have been accustomed to look upon treaties as scraps of paper unworthy to be observed if it suits their purpose to violate them."

"We do not believe the president nor the allies will be satisfied with anything short of unconditional surrender, and I think the president makes that perfectly clear in his note, leaving to General Foch and the allied commanders the adjustment of terms of any armistice that may be entered into, to be followed by the German armies."

"I have sometimes thought there ought to be an end of note passing, between Germany and the allied powers. Their effect is to withdraw the attention of the people of the allied countries from the battle front where the supreme sacrifice is being made, to waste preparation for a forceful and continued drive towards Berlin and to give the central powers an opportunity to rearrange their program for a further offensive."

"The sooner our enemies are given unequivocally to understand that nothing short of unconditional surrender will be accepted, the sooner will peace come and with it the end of a disastrous war."

**HEALTH BOARD GIVES WARNING OF INFLUENZA DANGER**

**COMMERCIAL CLUB MEMBERSHIP DRIVE BEGINS ON MONDAY**

**City Has Been Districted And Committees Named For Quick Campaign.**

A campaign for Commercial club memberships will be pushed on next Monday morning. With 50 or more prominent professional and business men on the job it is estimated that the necessary membership of 400 can easily be secured during the day.

At a called meeting held last evening at the Commercial club, T. B. Kay, manager of the campaign explained his plan by which the club could be put on its feet financially. His ideas met with unanimous approval and was adopted.

In order that none may be overlooked who should feel enough interest in the city and community to support the club, Mr. Kay has divided the city into 17 districts and a chairman appointed for each with at least two committee men to work with him. Each committee will be given cards showing who have been the supporters of the Commercial club for the past three years and also the names of those in his district who have failed to support the club but should do so on account of business interests.

A motion of Gideon Stolz prevailed by which the club will use some of its surplus funds invested in bonds for the payment of indebtedness incurred during the past three months in order that when the new subscriptions begin Nov. 1, the club will have no indebtedness whatever. It developed in the discussion that 169 members have been pledged since the expiration of the three year pledges last May and to secure 169, the town and community had been thoroughly canvassed. But with this 169 to begin with, it was felt there would be no difficulty in securing the 400 or more members necessary to maintain the club.

There was a general feeling that not only the business and professional men should support the club, but also men who are living in the city and have their investments in prune and other fruit orchards. An effort will be made also to secure non-resident memberships at \$5 each from those in the community who benefit from the activities of the club.

An effort will also be made to secure an appropriation from both the city and county and to take up this matter with the council and county court a committee was appointed consisting of Dan J. Fry, chairman, Chasney Bishop, Fred Thielsen and W. L. Staley.

All committee members will meet Monday morning at 9 o'clock at the Commercial club and after receiving final instructions and proper blanks for receiving membership pledges, the campaign will be on. With the feeling that Salem is almost unanimous in support of the club, it is thought that

Not only did the company pay for 3,000 tons of potatoes in the local market this year, but it has purchased from the farmers locally the following: 1,400,000 pounds of carrots; 800,000 pounds of onions; 200,000 pounds of squash; 200,000 pounds of celery; 1,000,000 pounds of prunes, besides an immense quantity of loganberries. It was through the efforts of the Salem Commercial club that the Salem King's Product Company established a plant in the city.

Four opinions were handed down by the supreme court today, as the court is preparing to go to Pendleton to hold court, beginning Monday. The opinions were as follows:

M. Merriman Houston, et al. vs. W. M. Barnett, et al. appellant; appealed from Multnomah; suit to enforce specific performance of terms of lease; opinion by Justice Johns; Circuit Judge McGinn affirmed.

Leo Ahonen, by Jacob Ahonen, his guardian vs. Wm. Hrysko, appellant; appealed from Multnomah; action to recover compensation for personal injuries; opinion by Justice Benson; Circuit Judge Kavanaugh affirmed.

Thomas Hodgson, et al. appellants, vs. J. M. Martin, executor of will of James N. Curtin; appealed from Douglas; suit to enjoin action of forcible entry and detainer, and to enforce specific contract to convey tract of land; opinion by Chief Justice McBride; judgment of Circuit Judge Hamilton modified and affirmed.

H. L. Sablin, appellant, vs. Levi Christman, sheriff of Wasco county, and Portland Association of Credit Men; appealed from Wasco; action for damages for conversion; opinion by Justice Bean; Circuit Judge Bradshaw reversed and case remanded.

**Bumper Wheat Supply Is Officially Reported**

Washington, Oct. 23.—A bumper supply of wheat on hand the first of October is shown in a statement issued today by the department of agriculture. At that time there were 195,997,839 bushels reported on hand, as compared with 114,231,842 September 1. The supply, the report shows, is almost three times as large as a year ago, the actual percentage being 397.6 of the 1917 stock. These figures refer to stocks actually reported and do not include stocks on farms.
