******************************* OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL WAR EMERGENCY COURSE AND CERTIFICATE

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The course will begin with each of the terms commencing Nov. 16, 1918; February 8, 1919 and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year.

This course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent. No age limit is required for entrance, but be-fore a certificate can be issued applicant must be at least eighteen years of age.

All regular courses will be offered as usual.
