The Salem Indian school at Chemawa

has been having a pretty serious time with the Spanish influenza. With an attendance of 600 or more, there has been reported during the past two weeks, 250 cases of which 16 were fatal. However, today things are reported greatly improved as only two are in the hospital, and no new cases. For the past two weeks no attempt was made to hold the regular school sessions. Every one of the 55 employed at the school has been giving attention to those who have been ill. Superintendent Hall reports that all have had the best of care and that with no new cases developing today he feels the worst is over.

There are in Salem today 3,306 children

of school age, according to the school census completed last week. One year ago the census showed that 3,972 were in the Salem school district. This loss of 666 is attributed largely to the fact that so many families have moved to Portland or Astoria to engage in the ship yard work and it is these families that had the largest number of school children. The falling off in the census is also thought to be due to the fact that many did not understand that a report must be made of every one in the family between the ages of four and 21 years. There are also many boys and girls just under the age of 21 who are working elsewhere than in Salem this year and in many families these were not reported, although their actual home was in Salem.

On account of the Spanish influenza,

the directors of the Liberty school south of Salem have decided to close their school until further notice. When it is deemed advisable to open the school, due notice will be given in the Capital Journal.

The funeral services of Clarence E. Miles,

who died Oct. 21 at Fort Pitt, Oklahoma, will be held at the Webb & Clough chapel tomorrow morning. The services will be conducted by the Rev. H. N. Aldrich and burial will be in the City View cemetery.

From a police standpoint it is not

the proper time to come out within the city limits during this cold snap. Last night an Australian by the name of Jackson was caught in the act of building a little camp fire out towards the Southern Pacific depot. The canopy of heaven is not considered by the Salem police as a sufficient covering these chilly and rainy evenings and the Australian was taken to the city jail to continue his slumbers.
