Voters Should Place 'X' Before Name Voted For

Voters of Oregon are advised by Attorney General Brown to place at the left of any names written in on the ballot at the November election an X, in the same way that the X is placed before the names of candidates whose names are printed on the ballot sheets.

A meeting was held last evening of the Community board cooperating with the U. S. Employment bureau in Salem. A survey of labor conditions will be made in Salem. A list of 88 firms and manufacturing plants in Salem each employing more than five people was submitted last evening.

The United War Fund is for seven patriotic organizations. The total amount to be raised in the country is \$170,000,000. The quota for Marion county is \$42,000.

LATEST WAR BULLETINS

Zurich, Oct. 30.—The Austro-Hungarian government of Montenegro fled to Vienna, following the uprising in that country, a dispatch from Laibach, reported today. Montenegro Comitadjis have entered Cetinje, the capital.

Rome, Oct. 30.—The Italians have reached the Livorno river. The Livorno river is 12 miles east of the Piave. Vittorio, the great Austrian base is situated on the west bank.

With the Italian Armies, in the Field, Oct. 30.—American troops from Ohio, under command of General Treat, have crossed the Piave and taken up the advance.

Berlin, via London, Oct. 30.—A French attack on an eleven-mile front between Niay-Le-Comte and the Aisne, in which great numbers of tanks were employed, was completely beaten back, the German war office announced today.

Parts of our position northwest of Herpy, which were temporarily lost, were recaptured by a counter attack, the state said. Heavy losses were inflicted on the enemy yesterday and many tanks were destroyed.

Germans Still Violate Rules Of Civilized War

New York, Oct. 30.—That the Germans had not abandoned tactics they employed when they overran Belgium and France in the early days of the war and when they violated every clause of the Hague convention, is evidenced by the latest British official report received here today by the British bureau of information.

Advancing troops of the British Fifth army, under General Birdwood, the famous Aussie leader, according to the report, recently captured Red Cross wagons loaded to the tops with ammunition. This capture, it was pointed out, was made at the time the German high command was protesting sincerity in its plea for an armistice.
