In the last two years 324 boys have been received at the Oregon state training school for boys and 305 have been paroled and 33 have escaped, according to the biennial report of Superintendent L. M. Gilbert.

Fourteen of the boys received at the institution were only 10 years old, and one was nine, 18 were 11 years old, 28 were 12, 44 were 13, 58 were 14, 71 were 15, 49 were 16, 26 were 17, and 15 were 18.
