NOTHING EXCITING IN CITY ELECTION

City Marshal Contest And Proposed City Amendment To Be Voted On.

Official ballots have now been printed for the city election next Tuesday. The voter in Salem will cast his ballot for city officials according to ward residence. For the county and state election, the ballot will be cast according to the precinct in which the voter lives.

For the city election by wards, the voting will be cast as follows:

Ward 1: Garfield school house.

Ward 2: City Hall.

Ward 3: Court school.

Ward 4: Hickory bark building, corner of Mill and 12th streets.

Ward 5: Reddaway's store.

Ward 6: Cameron's paint shop.

Ward 7: Klender's building, corner of Miller and South Commercial streets.

In Ward 1, everything is settled except the contest between Percy M. Varney and J. E. Wright for city marshal, and the proposed amendment.

Voters in Ward 2 will have only the privilege of marking the ballot two times—one on the question of city marshal and the other on the proposed amendment.

In Ward 3, the voters will pass on three propositions—that of the city marshal, proposed charter amendment and as to whether J. S. Austin or B. E. Edwards will be one of the aldermen. Otto J. Wilson was re-elected at the May primaries.

Ward 4 elected its alderman at the May primaries. In fact for ward 4 everything was settled at the primaries excepting the contest between Percy M. Varney and J. E. Wright for city marshal. Voters in this ward may also add proposal on no foreign no outside

men from ward 4; Merlin Harding and Edward Schunke from ward 5; James McClelland and W. A. West from ward 6, and Ralph Thompson from ward 7.

Ward 6, Cameron's paint shop is pretty well known in this ward as it has been the voting place for many a year. The electors have only two crosses to make—one on the city marshal contest and the other on the proposed bonding amendment.

Ward 7. Things are a little more interesting in this ward as there is a pretty fair contest on for alderman between Dr. O. L. Scott and H. L. Clark, besides the city marshal question and the city amendment proposition. This ward has the distinction of having the only man who is running for two offices at the same time, as H. L. Clark is the independent candidate for county judge, besides that of running for alderman.

At the spring primaries, where any one candidate received a majority of all votes cast, this is equivalent to election. Hence the voters in the city do not again vote for a city clerk or a city treasurer. At the primaries R. W. Simeral and P. J. Smith were elected aldermen from ward 1; Dr. F. L. Utter and H. H. Vandervort were elected aldermen from ward 2; O. J. Wilson was elected from ward 3; A. H. Moore and Paul V. Johnson were elected alder-

men from ward 4; Merlin Harding and Edward Schunke from ward 5; James McClelland and W. A. West from ward 6, and Ralph Thompson from ward 7.

OBITUARY.

Tribute to Memory of Mabel Bradford Purvine.

In the passing to the spiritual world on October 21, 1918, of Mrs. J. F. Purvine many hearts were touched to tender grief at the seeming loss to the living.

Although born in Washington, Iowa, March 4, 1888, her childhood spent in the east, her later years spent in Salem and Spring Valley, she was truly a western girl, the type all the world loves—tender, faithful, loving, with the high courage, brave spirit, which did always lighten care and make merry with joy.

Her love for the beautiful out-doors the woods, the hills, and the blue sky and for all the green things that grow was a passion second only to her love for her friends.

Her early education was gained in Iowa and after coming to Oregon she graduated from the Salem high school on October 23, 1907, she was married to J. F. Purvine. With the exception of one year spent in Salem, they have lived on the old home place of A. J. Her tenderness and devotion to her family are known best to them. Her

courage, loyalty and wide-reaching spirit of helpfulness are known to many.

Never did a little child appear to her without receiving full measure of consideration—one baby boy, Orlin R., died seven years ago.

Lowell B., aged four years, and her husband, survive her. Besides these her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Bradford, three sisters, Mrs. C. L. De Harport, of Salem, Irene and Helen at home, and four brothers, Miles, in the aviation corps, Elbert, in the training school in Portland, Buel and Dorryl at home.

She was a member of the Methodist church from girlhood, but finding no organization here of the same order, she united with the Presbyterian church. She was an enthusiastic worker in the missionary society and of the Red Cross since its organization, and it is here where she will be greatly missed.

The funeral was held October 24th and was conducted by Rev. W. T. Scott, assisted by Rev. G. A. McKinley, who have been long-time friends, and who have officiated in like services for the family several times.

The music was rendered by her most intimate friends in keeping with her wish.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Scott and Mr. and Mrs. France McKinley composed the quartette.

The floral offerings from her friends were many and beautiful.
