Amsterdam, Nov. 8.—The socialist-democratic members of the reichstag demanded that the kaiser abdicate by noon Friday (today), according to the Berlijn Voorwaarts. Unless the emperor complies, the deputies declared that they would leave the government.

IS GERMANY TO GET ECONOMIC CONTROL?

Washington, Nov. 8.—Defeat of Germany will not prevent her from gaining an economical strangle hold on Russia unless the allies take immediate steps to flood southern and northern Russia and Siberia with commodities most needed by the Russian people.

This warning was issued here today by Dr. Joseph M. Goldstein, professor of political economy at the University of Moscow and one of Russia's leading commercial authorities.

Dr. Goldstein, now on a tour of the United States, aiming to interest American business men and corporations in Russian trade, declared today that now that Germany is defeated, the bolsheviki can last but a few weeks more, that she herself would take steps to overthrow them. Once the bolsheviki go, Dr. Goldstein said, the race between Germany and the allies for control of the Russian market will begin.

"Germany," said Dr. Goldstein, "is prepared to flood the Russian market with goods. Unless the allies take immediate steps to counteract this, Germany will succeed in restoring her former economic supremacy in Russia and put allied business at a tremendous disadvantage."
