GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS VICTORY HOLIDAY

All Public And Private Business Suspends On Receipt Of News. At 7 o'clock this morning, when he heard the news of the signing of the armistice by the Germans and that the world war had come to an end, Governor Withycombe immediately declared today to be a legal holiday in celebration of the event. His proclamation says: "In honor of the glorious victory which has finally been recorded as won by the soldiers of democracy, I, James Withycombe, governor of Oregon, do hereby declare this day, November 11, 1918, a legal holiday to be observed throughout the state of Oregon as a day of thanksgiving and rejoicing. "In testimony whereof, I have hereunto subscribed my name and caused to be affixed the great seal of the state of Oregon. Done at Salem, the capital, this eleventh day of November, 1918." The governor also issued the following brief statement: "We are celebrating today what is probably the biggest event in history. It is a glorious victory and American arms and American verile manhood have been potent factors in the achievement of this great victory. "It seems now as if the military disposition of the Central Powers is to be transformed into a region of anarchy this will place tremendous responsibilities upon the allied governments. It is our sacred duty as patriotic Americans to put forth our best efforts to re-establish a permanent peace and to provide adequately for the return of our brave men at the front."

JOHN SHEPHERD DEAD

John Shepherd passed away Friday evening at 9:35 at his home on Wolfier Prairie after an illness of 10 days. The deceased was born in Brookville, Ontario, Canada, on February 7, 1840. Yet while a young man he moved to the United States and settled in Illinois where he was married 51 years ago to Almada Planted, of Light House Illinois. In 1902 he moved to California on account of poor health and lived there until eight years ago when he came to Clatskanie county where he lived until his death. He leaves besides his wife, two daughters Mrs. George Batchelor of Ashton, Illinois, and Mrs. Bonnie Wolfert of Needy, a brother Frank Shepherd in Canada, and a sister Mrs. James Bell of Cadillac, Michigan. To mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband, father and brother. Burial took place Sunday afternoon at the Zimmerman cemetery. There was only a short service at the grave by Rev. Lucas of Macksburg, owing to the prevailing influenza--Aurora Observer.
