Sharp Decline In Cattle Marked Monday

North Portland Nov. 12.—With 2,000 head of beef cattle in the stock yards at North Portland the market for the week ended steady, but as the day advanced the market suffered a sharp decline of 50 cents to \$1.00 per hundred on the fair to medium and cow stuff; steers held steady. Quotations follow: Prime steers, \$12.25@12.50; good to choice steers, \$11.00@11.50; medium to good steers, \$10.00@11.00; fair to medium steers, \$8.50@9.50; common to fair steers, \$7.00@8.00; choice cows and heifers, \$8.25@8.75; medium to good cows and heifers, \$6.50@7.50; fair to medium cows and heifers, \$5.50@6.50; canners, \$4.50@5.50; bulls, \$5.00@7.50; calves, \$9.00@12.00; stockers and feeders, 6.00@8.00.

With 4,200 hogs in the hog alleys trading opened slow and the market has suffered a sharp decline from last week's prices. Prime mixed, \$17.00@17.25; medium mixed, \$16.85@17.00; rough heavies, \$15.00@15.25; pigs, \$14.00@15.00; bulk, \$17.00.

TONNAGE ABSORBED BY NEED OF FOOD

Tourist Traffic To Europe Will Be Resumed By Early Spring.

New York, Nov. 13.—Ocean passenger traffic to Europe will be resumed by early summer, New York steamship agents, declare here today.

The need of the European population for food, raw materials for industry and reconstruction will absorb all tonnage for some time, it was stated. There is no immediate prospect of the government control of shipping being removed.

Although some tourist traffic may be under way in several months, an official of a large American line stated that there was no chance of it assuming pre-war proportions. He said it was not merely a question of providing steamship accommodations at this end, but return journeys would have to be considered, as all accommodations from the other side would be needed for troops. Plans of the steamship men at present time are very uncertain. They have no assurance that their liners and other vessels will be restored by the government in the near future.

Steamship offices here have been swamped for several days with telephone inquiries regarding the resumption of ocean travel. Tourist agents are anxious to start taking bookings for sightseers abroad. Business men and relatives of American soldiers also are clamoring for passage.

YANKEES PUT UP NEW SIGNS ON OLD ROADS

American Slang Appears On Sign Boards On French Highways.

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) With the American Armies in France, Oct. 10.—(By Mail)—Tourists along the front will never have trouble locating the routes over which the American armies traveled, after the war.

Everywhere the Americans have been they left roads lined with signs, telling how to use the roads. It used to be that French signs gave you instructions about the road, and you usually guessed what they meant. Then the American military police got busy, selected some sign painters and now you have road advice in good old Yankee style.

"Go your bit—keep to the right" is the most frequent notice in huge letters. The French sign "Hold the right" doesn't give half the appeal. "Keep 'em rolling along—don't let the boche stop" is the American translation of "Forbidden to stop here."

"Get dead trucks off the roads," prevents any one from making repairs in the middle of the road. "Chop your converse" keeps the trains of trucks from preventing faster machines passing. At specified intervals space is left that will give room to pass.

"One way" roads are established by the military police when routes are too narrow to permit two lines of traffic. "Motorized routes" allow only automobiles and trucks privilege of passing, horse drawn vehicles having roads of their own.

"Don't walk in the middle of the road" is a painted suggestion to foot travelers who show tendencies of following that popular European habit.

"Lights out" warns you that boche aviators may be overhead—the army doesn't care so much whether the boche like you but doesn't want the roads blown up as the result of careless lights.

These are only a few of the signs of friendly advice which the army is leaving as a mark of its tracks.

TIME IS EXTENDED

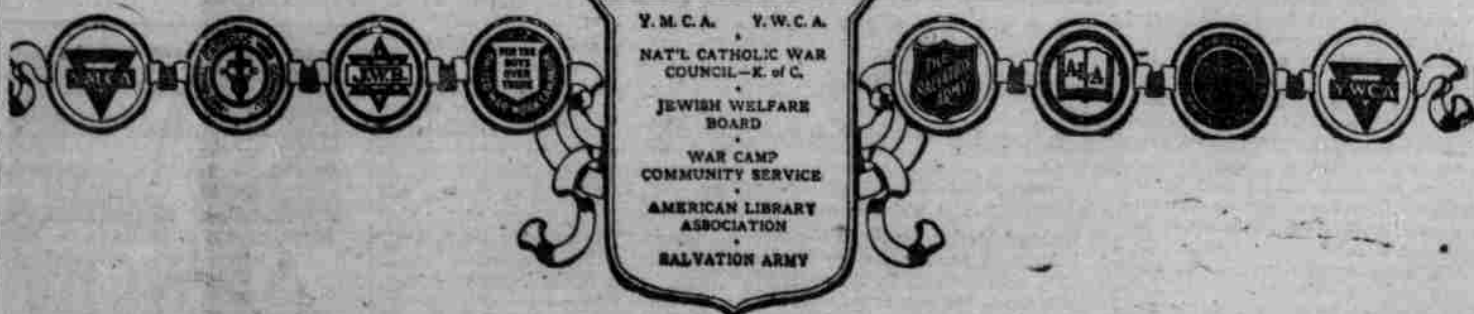
