## Army and Navy Are Aiding United War Work Campaign



UNEXPECTED impetus has been given to the United War Work Campaign by the formation of a National Army and Navy Campaign Advisory Committee, headed by Secretary Baker and Secretary Daniels. Serving with them to promote the plan to carry the drive for \$170,500,000 into the military camps and the naval stations and on board ships of the navy in American waters, are Major General George Barnett, Admiral William S. Benson, Benedict Crowell, Frederick P. Keppel, General Peyton C. March, Paymaster General Samuel McGowan, Admiral Leigh C. Palmer, Franklin D. Roosevelt and John D. Ryan. "It would be a serious mistake," says Secretary Baker, "not to afford the officers and enlisted men this opportunity to join with their fellow citizens in this great patriotic endeavor on behalf of their comrades in arms." Secretary Daniels declares that the plan is in keeping with the real American spirit of the hour, and adds: "Anyone who has seen what I have of the invaluable service rendered by the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., Catholic War Council, the Jewish Welfare Board, the American Library Association, the Salvation Army, and the Camp Community Service must be proud of these manifestations of unselfish interest of the American people in our boys of our large and ever-growing navy."
