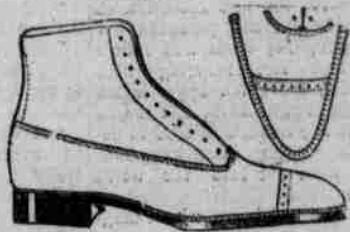

SENIORITY RULE WILL HAVE FIGHT FOR LIFE

chairmanships on merit rather than on length of service. The progressive wing of the party has always frowned on the seniority rule and now many of "the old liners" are showing signs of going against it.

Sweep Was in Middle West
 Analysis of the recent elections shows that the backbone of the republican sweep was in Kansas, Indiana, Ohio, Iowa and Missouri. If the seniority rule is followed in the next congress, Iowa will get one and perhaps two important committee chairmanships, Kansas one and the other states will be almost lost in the reckoning.

Michigan, where republicans gained one representative, would have Representative Fordney as chairman of the ways and means committee and floor leader, and Massachusetts, which lost a republican senator, would have appropriations. The passing of the seniority rule would not necessarily mean a "new deal all around," it was pointed out today.

Representative Kahn of California would be certain of the chairmanship of the military affairs committee and Representative Esch, Wisconsin, of the interstate commerce committee which is to handle legislation affecting the government control of the telegraph lines and railroads.

Big Loss In Marine Issues

Feature Of Today's Market

New York, Nov. 16.—The Evening Sun says:

The feature of the market today was the spectacular loss in Marine issues, the preferred in the early trading duplicating Friday's low for a loss of 3-4 points. Irregularity was shown by an early net loss of half point in U. S. Steel 1-3-4 in Mexican Petroleum, 1-1-2 in Baldwin, with a gain of 5-8 for Southern Pacific, 3-4 for Union Pacific, 2-3-8 for Industrial Alcohol and more than a point in Crucible.

Uncertainty and irregularity prevailed in the last hour, with a shading off in most of the issues of a point or more from the best prices of the day.

SAFETY ZONE ESTABLISHED.

London, Nov. 16.—The German command in a wireless to the allied command proposed today that an addition be made to the armistice, providing a "safety zone" of ten kilometers (six and a quarter miles) between the Germans and the allied and United States troops who are following up the evacuation.

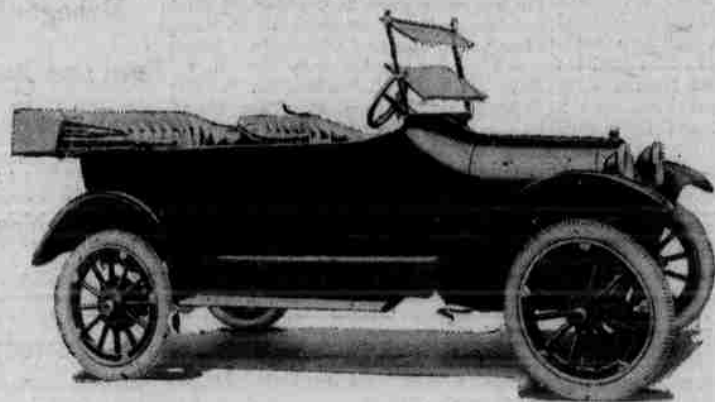

government can be obtained in these enemy states, there will be nobody to make peace with and nobody to pay the bill to France and Belgium for the fearful destruction that has been done. I would certainly approach this with mixed feelings, having been long a witness to the robbery of food from women and children and the destruction of millions of tons of food at sea and the misery under which the millions amongst the biggest of the allies have suffered under the German yoke. Justice requires that government be established that is able to make up for wrongs done, and it cannot be accomplished through the spread of anarchy. Famine is the mother of anarchy.

KING'S ENTRY POSTPONED

London, Nov. 16.—(6:40 p. m.)—King Albert's entry into Brussels has been postponed on account of the disorders there, it was announced here.

Owing to pillaging and destruction of property in the city by German soldiers, allied military action may be necessary, it was stated.

New York, Nov. 16.—The Knights of Columbus plan to establish an employment bureau in each of its 1400 councils throughout the country to aid returning soldiers in obtaining work.

How The Starting Battery Started

"One of the oldest forms of storage batteries," says Mr. Degge, local Willard expert, "was composed of two sheets of lead with a strip of flannel between, all rolled up like a jelly roll and stuck on end in a bath of battery solution."

"Battery builders of those early days did not have any lead oxide to use in making the plates," said Mr. Degge, "so what the early experimenters and builders did was to connect two plates in a direct-current circuit and let the battery charge until it made one of the plates a positive and the other a negative."

"The first battery of this style was used in a lecture given by a French scientist, Plante, who created a great sensation because he was able to keep a little arc light going for a few minutes with the current developed. It was a remarkable thing, but as an automobile battery, such a device as this would not have been worth the trouble of attaching to the car."

"One of the weak points about this early battery was the fact that it had poor insulation. It was really two long pieces of lead with one insulator, and when this insulator broke down, as it

did in a very short time, the battery would not operate.

"It was from this beginning that the art of battery building grew to its present state. From that single strip of flannel between the two rolled-up plates, the wonderful Threaded Rubber Insulation that is so widely used today, has developed.
