day and hour that the Red Cross will accept cartons for Christmas presents, as the mailing office will be closed Nov. 30. During the past four days 100 cartons were issued on permits while heretofore, there has been only 200 issued on labels. It was estimated that 750 cartons would be called for and mailed from Salem alone, and against this estimate only 300 have been taken out.

Although some of the restrictions have been removed regarding the sale of the ingredients of explosives, conditions as in the past will continue the same for those who are in need of stumping powder or dynamite. Anyone needing such explosives is obliged to secure a permit to purchase from the county clerk.

It seems that a number of people from widely different sections of the country are becoming interested in the fruit possibilities of Oregon. Every day letters are received at the Commercial club asking for information, especially of that part of the valley near Salem. There is no late advertising literature to send the people interested in the west and all that can be mailed is the old pamphlet of Salem and vicinity prepared about five years ago. Inquiries were received today from Portland, Maine; Hoboken, New Jersey and Tucson, Arizona.

Friends of John Loder, city recorder of Oregon City, are greatly alarmed over his disappearance last Wednesday. Since he was last seen Wednesday no word has been heard from him although every effort has been made to find him. He is an attorney and at one time served on the city council of Oregon City. He is about 50 years old and has a family.

A "Victory" road from Portland to Salem decorated with triumphal arches looks better to a number of Portland people than an investment in a victory monument.
