Holland Has Troops Around Former Kaiser's Castle As Precaution. Amsterdam, Nov. 21.—(Delayed.)—The Dutch premier, speaking in the chamber today said: "The moment the Kaiser's presence is dangerous to Holland, he will have to leave."

HOLLAND IS STUBBORN. By Lowell Mellett. (United Press Staff Correspondent) London, Nov. 27.—While legal authorities of the British government have not decided that the allies are entitled to demand extradition of the former Kaiser, it is learned that Holland is not yet persuaded on that point. The Dutch government is understood to maintain that Wilhelm can only be extradited by Germany, or, if his fate is decided at the peace conference he will then be given up in accordance with such decision inasmuch as Germany will be represented.
