Now it is the helping of the poor and destitute in Belgium, and other countries to which the energies of the Red Cross will be directed. The quota for the northwest division of the Red Cross is 64,000 garments. Willamette chapter has been assigned the making of the following: 480 handkerchiefs, 290 convalescent robes, 750 pajamas, the making of undershirts from 348 yards of cloth, besides a big allotment of socks and sweaters. The materials for the making of this allotment are expected to arrive within a few days.
