Navy Recruiting Has Reverted To Old Style

J. E. Adams, formerly navy recruiting officer in Salem with office in the post office building, writes that the present method of obtaining man power for the navy has reverted to the old style of recruiting which was abolished last August.

Writing from Portland, he says, the station there is taking all applicants who can successfully pass the physical tests and who are between the ages of 18 and 35 years.

The term of enlistment in the navy is four years with privileges and chances for advancement. The ratings now open are as follows: Boilermakers, 21 to 35 years; blacksmiths, 21 to 35 years; firemen, 21 to 35 years; machinist mates and shipwrights, 21 to 35 years; apprentice seamen, 18 to 30 years; landsman for baker or landsman for cook, 18 to 30 years; landsman for electrician, 18 to 25 years; hospital apprentice, 18 to 25 years and mess attendant, 18 to 25.
