Now that the Red Cross drive for \$1 memberships is on, all reports are to be sent in to headquarters for the county in charge of W. M. Smith, county superintendent. To facilitate work, the workers are asked to make their reports before 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Although the final reports of the work are not to be forwarded until next week, it is the plan of the workers to close the membership campaign this week. All membership work is directed from the office of Mr. Smith at the courthouse and it is to him that all reports should be made.
Fred Schindler, second hand dealer, was arrested this morning and brought before Judge Earl Race, charged with buying a bicycle wheel from a person under the age of 21 years and not reporting the purchase to the police, as provided by the city statutes. The wheel was bought of Albert Keeler, a boy about 13 years old. Upon pleading guilty he was given a sentence of either paying a fine of \$25 or spending 12 1/2 days in the county jail. As the lesser of two evils, he chose to pay the \$25.
Dr. Mark S. Skiff received most welcome news today in a letter from Captain Hamble. The information is given that his son, Mark S. Skiff Jr., was safe and in fine health on November 10, just the day before the firing ceased. His company was camped along the banks of the Meuse river when it was all over. Young Skiff engaged in five offensive movements and was in the big American advance at St. Mihiel not far from Verdun and in the Argonne woods fighting. He went into the service in July of 1917 and was made sergeant after training at Eugene. He was then assigned to the 65th artillery at Ft. Stevens as radio sergeant and was with the Ft. Stevens artillery passing through the Panama canal on the way to Europe.
The Marion county delegation of five representatives and two senators met yesterday and elected Sam T. Hughes chairman and Ivan G. Martin secretary. In order that it may receive suggestions for legislation the Marion county representatives and senators will meet on the fourth floor of the Masonic Temple Wednesday evening when it will be pleased to confer with the good citizens of the county who have some extra ideas and suggestions as to what the county needs in the way of improvement on the present laws.
