Denies Authenticity Of Newspaper Dispatch

Paris, Dec. 18.—"I am not only in favor of the league of nations, but I believe formation of such a league is absolutely indispensable to the maintenance of peace," President Wilson declared today.

The president made this statement in denying the authenticity of a dispatch published in an American newspaper, declaring he approved the plan of the League to Enforce Peace.

"It is entirely false," the president said. "I am, as every one knows, not only in favor of the league of nations, but I believe formation of such a league is absolutely indispensable to the maintenance of peace. But the particular plan of the League to Enforce Peace was never, directly or indirectly endorsed by me."

Dealers in Salem who happen to be loaded up on flour substitutes may soon find relief as it is probable that an effort will be made to collect and ship according to the instructions of the federal food administration. The order to allow the free use of white flour came so suddenly that all dealers were left with substitutes on hand more than could be sold. C. M. Lockwood, county food administrator, said today that he intends to see notice to all dealers in regard to collecting a car lot here. Substitutes included in the order are victory flour, barley flour, patent rye flour, white corn flour, yellow corn flour, cream corn flour and a few others. Practically all restrictions have been removed as to the use of flour and food and one may dip deep into the sugar bowl and feel patriotic at the same time.
