Under date of Nov. 15, from Paris. Scregant Russell M. Brooks write home as follows in regards to the armistice: "To my dying day I will never ceas

to wonder at the calm of the French people extending over a period of about two hours before pandemonium broke loose. Perhaps it was the inability to comprehend after their sorrows and sufferings, that this was really the end.
"Then miraculous things began to Musician Edward P Stroud, Philadel-happen. The people began to throng the streets, first crowds of soldiers, Wagoner Norman L Buchanan, Colby who seized the women and kissed them,

and then crowds of younger folks, boys and girls, always the French flag at their head. By three o'clock you could THOS. K. Little processions were organized which grew with the speed of a snowball.
"At 4:30 o'clock the bells rang and

workmen were placing lights that had been torn down four years before. On the bulletin board was the simple sen tence 'L'armistice est signee.' "As for myself and when we will return and what we are to do, that remains unanswered at present.'
