"Yesterday the armistice was signed and there is now peace and good will in the front. Last night the Boches came over and wanted to exchange souvenirs but we had orders to drive them back."

"We are expecting to move soon as orders say we must follow them clear back to the Rhine. We feel we are lucky to be one of the divisions to see the Rhine and to follow the Boog out of France."

"We are now advanced into the regions the Germans held for four years and it is out of the shell hole fire zone so of course the buildings are in good condition. We have real chairs and tables, a clothes closet and two kerosene lamps. So you see we are fairly comfortable."

"The paper I am writing on was part of the German doctor's effects. He used to have charge of the graveyard next to us. The graves were well taken care of and showed they expected to be left there and that this was to be German soil after the war."

"There are three or four good pianos in town and many piano players. So we are having plenty of music. The Boches are having a great time over their side tonight blowing bugles and shooting off their spare rockets. They are certainly happy that peace is now a probability."

Washington, Dec. 14.—General March declared officially today nothing had been reported to the war department to substantiate rumors that Brigadier General Foltz was reduced in rank for inefficiency or sacrifice of men needlessly. He explained the war department had concurred in General Pershing's recommendation that Foltz be returned to the United States and also to his regular army grade of colonel.
