Here is the form for the address and also the return address: From Mrs. John Doe, 479 Rose Street, Salem, Oregon. Sergeant John K. Doe, Co. D, 93d Infantry, American Expeditionary Force. Complaints are being received by postal authorities that letters have not been delivered to soldiers. If the writer would place the return address on the upper left hand corner of the envelope, then if the soldier cannot be located, the letter will be returned to the
