## Two Great Events in War Happened At Harwich

Harwich, England, Dec. 12. — (By mail.)—Harwich, the port to which the German submarines came to surrender, will be remembered by the English as the port firing the first British shot of the war.

At 8 o'clock the morning of Aug. 6, 1914, four hours after England declared war, the Harwich forces under Admiral Tyrwhitt put out into the North Sea. By 5 they had sunk the German mislaying cruiser, Koepnig Luis.
