Famous Jackson Hill May No Longer Trouble Autos

Jackson hill, six miles south of Salem, and famous in the early days of the state as a lookout point between Portland and the south may no longer be the bane of autos, with engines not fitted for hill climbing. At a meeting of the county court yesterday afternoon, the court ordered a survey made to conform to the survey made by the state highway commission and if the views should make a favorable report a road around the hill will eventually be constructed. Just at present there is a nine per cent grade over the hill, equal to that on South High street over the Dan J. Fry hill, traveling south. In the early stage coach days, when Jackson Hill was famous the grade over the hill was 25 per cent one. The new grade to be surveyed will make the road a five per cent grade. Should the new road be ordered, it would require about three miles of road building, but the trend of the road in that section is such that the general traveling distance north and south would not be increased. If the new road is built, the present one will be retained as a community road.

Fewer Attorneys Admitted To Practice Law This Year

Cases disposed of by the Oregon supreme court during the year 1918 were 29 in excess of the number of new cases filed, being a distinct gain for the year, according to a summary compiled by Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the court. The number of cases disposed of totalled 393, while 264 new cases were filed. There were 336 written opinions handed down. Eighty cases were reversed, 128 affirmed and 25 modified. Fees collected during the year totaled \$9,323.06, of which \$1000 was for admission of attorneys to practice law. There were fewer attorneys admitted than for many years, as receipts for admission to the bar averaged \$3000 a year for the preceding five years. There were 26 attorneys admitted to the bar on examination and 10 from other states.

Express Company Granted Increased Commodity Rates

Washington, Jan. 4.—The American Railway Express company today was granted increased commodity rates on fruit and vegetables from express stations in Alabama, Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Texas to all points in all states east of Florida. The interstate commerce commission granted the increase without a formal hearing.
