COLONEL YOUNG WHO HAD CHARGE OF S.A.T.C. VICTIM OF INFLUENZA

Was Spanish War Veteran And Was Always Active In Military Affairs.

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 6.—Colonel Geo. S. Young, one of the most prominent army men in the west, died last night at the Vancouver Barracks post hospital. The Colonel became ill with influenza at Salem where he had charge of the Student Army Training Corps at Willamette University, two weeks ago, and at his request, was removed to the post hospital here. When only 20 years old, Young was commissioned by President Grant. He saw considerable service during Indian Wars and in the Spanish American engagements. He came to Vancouver in 1912 as Colonel of the 21st Infantry. Colonel Young was retired in May, 1917 and was recalled when the United States declared war, being placed in charge of army recruiting in Oregon. He was born at Harpers Ferry, Va., May 17, 1854.

Three Little Children All Victims Of Influenza

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the Bigdon chapel for three children and the three were taken in one hearse for burial this afternoon in City View cemetery. John Clark Marr, age 14, died last Thursday at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Marr, who live on Fairmount avenue. Dale Tillson Marr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Marr, died Sunday morning from influenza at the age of one year and eight months. Una Ledaqu Johnson, six years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Johnson, who live on Willson avenue, died Sunday morning at the home of her parents. She was a cousin of the two Marr children.

New City Administration Launches Fight Against Flu

Every effort will be made by the incoming city administration to stamp out influenza in the city. At a meeting held yesterday afternoon by Mayor C. E. Albin, City Physician Ray Pemberton and the city council committee on health consisting of Dr. F. Utter, chairman, A. H. Moore and H. H. Vandevort, it was decided that the police should be empowered to prevent loitering in any depot, standing around restaurants or pool halls and congregating of people in any store whatever. The spitting ordinance will also be enforced. At restaurants, in the serving of drinks, straws must be used. People are urged to bank early and to shop early and to do everything possible to avoid the least semblance of crowding. As to the meeting of the legislature next Monday, no action was taken. It is felt that the legislature will handle the proposition for itself and that the city could not very well order the legislature to postpone its meeting. However, the authority of the city could prevent crowding in hallways of the state house, it was thought.

BLOCKADE MAY BE LIFTED.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The state department let it be known today that it believes economic restrictions against Germany must be relaxed if indemnities are to be paid by that nation. At the same time the view was expressed that the blockade may be lifted before the peace treaty is actually signed.

ENVOY TO BERLIN LEAVES.

Copenhagen, Jan. 6.—M. Radek, Russian bolshevik envoy to Berlin, has left Berlin, according to an official announcement from Berlin today. Another dispatch said police prefect Eicher, bolshevik appointee, had been removed from office by the German cabinet and had been succeeded by Herr Ernst managing director of the Socialist organ Vorwarts.

VICTOR BERGER TRIAL.

Chicago, Jan. 6.—Arguments were to begin today in the train here before Federal Judge Landis of Victor Berger, congressman-elect from Milwaukee, and four other socialists charged with espionage act violations.

LUDENDORFF WILL STAND TRIAL.

London, Jan. 6.—General Ludendorff former chief of the German armies, announced his willingness to stand trial shortly after the armistice was signed, but the government permitted him to leave the country, according to the Dusseldorf Nachrichten.

NATIONAL SECURITY PROBE.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The scene of the congressional probe into the affairs of the National Security League will be transferred from the capital to New York Thursday where hearings will be resumed, probably in the rooms of the bar association. This was decided today when the hearing was resumed with Charles E. Lydecker, president of the league, on the stand.

Court House Notes

In the case of the city of Turner against Jennie Hall, involving the right to the use of the flow of the water from Green Springs, the defendant has asked the court to strike out

The E. H. Holt Piano House is its suit against C. F. Hall moved the court for judgment for the reason that from the records, the plaintiff is entitled to judgment.

The county court ordered that the disbursements be allowed in the court expenses of F. E. Grigby as administrator of the estate of Wana Miller Alexander Stuart. Suits were brought in the district court of the United States for the district of Oregon against Sarah Miller and J. O. Hayes. The costs of the suit in the district court was \$1592.64 besides a judgment against the executor for \$875.63 costs. As the estate is to be administered in California, it was ordered that the expenses incurred in the law suits be allowed and a claim for the amount be presented to the administrators of the estate in California. The suit involved the transfer of several hundred acres of land in the Lake Labish section and was based on the undue influence of Sarah E. Miller over Wana Miller Alexander Stuart.
