Begins New Term When
Legislature Convenes.

The newly elected state officials took office today, while those who were re-elected merely filed new bonds and renewed their oaths of office. Governor Withycombe is the only one of the re-elected officials who will not begin his second term until next week, as he awaits the convening of the legislature before being inaugurated.

O. P. Hoff succeeded T. B. Kay as state treasurer, but he suffered an unfortunate accident this morning and was forced to return home early. He fell on the icy steps at his home and injured his hip. Mrs. Hoff fell on the same steps several days ago and is still confined to her bed with the injuries she suffered.

Fred A. Williams succeeded Frank J. Miller as public service commissioner. The commission will meet in Portland this afternoon to organize by electing a chairman.

C. H. Gram took office as labor commissioner, succeeding Mr. Hoff. A. S. Bennett took office as justice of the supreme court, succeeding Justice Olson.

Percy A. Cupper was elected superintendent of water division No. 1, but he will perform the duties of that office while serving as state engineer, to which position he has been appointed.

Besides the governor, officials who were re-elected and began serving their new terms include J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction; Geo. M. Brown, attorney general; and Geo. T. Cochran, superintendent of water division No. 2.

Amsterdam, Jan. 6.—Berlin newspapers declared today that Chancellor Ebert, Philip Scheidemann and other majority socialist members of the German cabinet have tendered their resignations to the Central Council of Soviets.

Eighteen Hundred Influenza Cases This Year In Frisco

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—Eighteen hundred cases of influenza have been reported to date this year according to Dr. Wm. Hassler, health officer.

Five per cent of all cases result in death, he said today. Fifteen deaths and 300 new cases were reported this morning. Teachers and students went to school masked today.

San Franciscans Boom Johnson For President

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson today rises as the most likely candidate of the republican party at the next presidential election, according to his friends here.

In city hall political circles this morning it was being widely proposed that the death of Colonel Roosevelt will mean the launching of a Johnson boom. Roosevelt admirers will back Senator Johnson solidly. It is predicted. The recent speeches on the Russian and other international questions have thrust him prominently into the limelight.

Ford Filed Petition With Senate For Vote Recount

Washington, Jan. 6.—Henry Ford today filed with the senate a petition for a recount of votes and a contest of the election of Truman H. Newberry as United States senator. Ford accompanied his petition with charges. These charges included "intimidation of employees of certain large corporations." Reporting of votes in some precincts without verification from poll books or tally sheets. Declaration that Newberry knew of the expenditures of more than \$176,000 in his behalf, despite his denial.

German Says He Wants Just And Right Peace

Copenhagen, Jan. 6.—"I will negotiate a just and right peace, but not a peace by force which would mean the annihilation and slavery of Germany," German Foreign Minister Blockdorff Bantzen declared in an official statement received here today. "Our enemy is trying to throw suspicion upon the German revolution." The assertion that the revolution
