THIRTY-TWO JAPANESE SHIPS SUNK DURING WAR

Tokio, Dec. 10.—(By Mail).—Thirty-two Japanese ships were sunk by Germany, according to information which was divulged at the Kobe Chamber of Commerce, during a meeting of representatives of Japan's largest ship owners. The total tonnage lost amounted to 132,384 tons. The meeting was held to consider what compensation should be exacted from Germany for the losses. A committee of three owners was chosen to determine the cost of the ships; the amount of money they would have earned had they not been destroyed; the total relief funds paid out to the families of the ships' lost crews, etc. It is roughly estimated that the amount of compensation to be demanded from Germany will be about 200,000,000 yen.

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be it resolved by the mayor and common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, constituting and acting as the board of health of said city. That all churches, schools, theaters, armories, lodge rooms, public halls, pool halls, clubs having open operating pool and billiard parlors, and card rooms in cigar stores, be and they are hereby closed to the public until further orders of this board. That all stores and mercantile establishments are hereby prohibited from advertising that are commonly known as 'special sales,' until further orders of this board; and all public funerals are prohibited. All persons, except those having business therein, are hereby prohibited from entering depots, banks, cigar stores, confectionery stores, restaurants, hotels, soft drink establishments, stores and mercantile establishments. All business with the public in said places must be quickly transacted. Loafing and loitering in and around said places is hereby prohibited. That the health officer, and the marshal and police officers of the city of Salem are hereby instructed and directed to strictly and diligently enforce these regulations, and ordinance No. 356 in regard to spitting on sidewalks and in other public places. ASSOCIATES OF KINDOLON CLING TO MURDER THEORY

San Francisco, Dec. 9.—Despite the coroner's opinion that Patrick J. Kindolon, chief special agent of the Southern Pacific, shot and killed himself, his associates cling firmly today to the murder theory and set about to prove it. They produced a woman whose name was concealed, who declared she heard two shots from the park where Kindolon's body was found in the early morning. Only one shell in Kindolon's revolver had been discharged. The detectives were searching today for the bullet that killed Kindolon, believing that it would prove of different calibre than Kindolon's gun. The murdered, they said, either was fired on by Kindolon, or discharged Kindolon's gun to give the suicide theory color.
