DAN KELLAHER LOSES OUT IN DECISION OF STATE SUPREME COURT

Judgement, However, Was Close, Being Three For And Four Against Him.

By a vote of four to three Dan Kellaher of Portland lost out this morning when the supreme court handed down an opinion in the case of the state of Oregon through J. L. Perkins against Dan Kellaher, involving the question as to City Commissioner for Portland.

However, the decision was a close one with Justices McBride, Bean and Bennett sustaining the legal effect of the law and thereby giving the office to Kellaher, who believed that under the terms of the city charter, Kellaher was entitled to the office.

Justices Benson, Burnett, Harris and Johns held the opinion sustaining Perkins in his contention that Kellaher's term of office expired Nov. 1, 1918.

When Perkins was elected city commissioner of Portland last fall, Dan Kellaher refused to turn over the office to him claiming that by virtue of his appointment he was entitled to hold until July 1, 1919. As Mr. Perkins was elected for the short term as city commissioner, he will now take the office and hold until the expiration of the short term, July 1, 1919.

Other opinions handed down were: Mary Doherty, administratrix of the estate of Thomas Doherty, vs. Hazelwood Co., appellants; Multnomah county; petition for rehearing denied; opinion by Justice Benson.

Andrew Morgan Beakey et al, appellants, vs. Clara Knutson, executrix of the will of C. C. Johnson, et al; Multnomah county; petition for rehearing denied; opinion by Chief Justice McBride.

E. L. Ridley, appellant vs. Portland taxicab Co., Multnomah county; suit for damages for personal injuries; opinion by Justice Harris who reverses and remands case to lower court, Judge Geo. N. Davis.

Application of the county court of Lane county for relief in connection with the appropriation of county road number 65 by the Willamette Pacific company, appellants; Lane county; opinion by Justice Johns; decision by Judge Percy R. Kelly reversed.

Petitions for rehearing were denied in Clifford vs. O-W R. & N. Co.; and State vs. Goodall.

Notes From The House Of Representatives

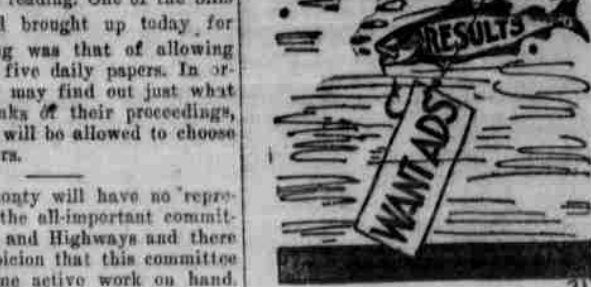
Ministers' association. This morning the House is concerned, no one would ever know there was such a thing as the "flu."
