School being closed again on account of the flu, Miss Margaret Miller has returned to Portland and Miss Schifferer to Turner. Five teachers are present with the malady. John Crabtree is here from Portland for a visit with relatives. The Brown-Petzel saw mill is closed while repairs are being made. The heavy timbers supporting the mill had become badly rotted and are being replaced by new ones and other repairs are being made. John Thomas was in Portland several days on the council, expressing his views on the future conduct of city affairs. His ideas are progressive and it is hoped that he will have the support of the council in carrying some of them to a successful conclusion. The city has nearly \$5000 in its treasury. Irwin Griffith Elected Chairman Salem Hospital

At the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Salem hospital held last evening, it was agreed that the hospital should vacate its present quarters at once and turn the property over to the state, thus avoiding ejection proceedings. The committee on securing temporary quarters was instructed to at once get busy in securing a building that could be remodeled and adapted to hospital uses. It is understood several suitable buildings have been under consideration and it is just a question as to which is best for the hospital. The emergency hospital will continue to be used by the Red Cross as its hospital and no influenza patients will be admitted to the Salem hospital in its present or new quarters. A. A. Lee as chairman of the executive committee, presented his resignation last evening and Irwin Griffith was elected to succeed. As the executive committee is chosen for but one year the terms of H. W. Meyers, F. G. Deekbach and William McGilchrist Jr. have expired. The committee is appointed by the chairman and it will now devolve upon Irwin Griffith as chairman for the coming year to appoint the three members. It is felt that if suitable quarters are secured for the hospital for at least a year, that the board of directors of the Salem hospital will at once begin laying plans for a hospital that will be a credit to the Capital City.
