this bill, the coming and going of those sent to the feeble minded asylum was optional. That is, the inmates then could leave whenever it struck their fancy.

A bill securing an amendment to the appropriation bill for child's welfare work in the state. The bill originally called for an appropriation of only \$3,000 but through the efforts it was made \$4000. She was also interested in an amendment to the widow's pension bill making it a workable law.

For this session the special interest of Mrs. Thompson is in juvenile welfare work and bills designed to raise the educational standards. She is chairman of the committee on education and is a member of the all important ways and means committee and also on the committee on alcoholic liquors.

Miss Celia Gavin, who is attending sessions of the legislature as secretary to Mrs. Thompson, has the unique distinction of serving as city attorney for The Dalles. She studied law at the

She has established a law practice of her own.

Mrs. Mabel C. Ellis, city treasurer of The Dalles, succeeded to an insurance business at the death of her husband. She has been re-elected three terms.

Mrs. Winnie Braden, recently elected manager of The Dalles Chamber of Commerce, is well known in Polk and Marion counties. She was at one time manager of the Dalles chamber of commerce, manager for the Polk county fair and was chosen from Polk county as a member of the state council of defense.

as "another crank nation." But it gathered strength Churches took it up, doctors followed and then came organizations of anti-liquor societies and the Anti-Saloon League and others.

In the middle of the Nineteenth century Maine went dry, Kansas followed. At the end of the civil war the little band of anti-slave agitators who had won their fight seriously considered turning to the prohibition battle. Their number included William Lloyd Garrison and the poet, Whittier.

About 1900 came the "militant" stage in the person of Carrie Nation of Kansas, probably the most picturesque figure the fight ever developed.

Ten years later the crusade against liquor had grown from the "raivings of cranks" into an irresistible movement that swept the country.

To Stage "Come Back."

But John Barleycorn will try to stage a "come back."

Distillers are already planning a fight on the amendment in the courts on the ground that it was not adopted by two thirds of the whole congress and that the seven year limitation in it invalidates the measure.

Drys say they are confident that neither of these contentions will hold and on their side are preparing legislation carrying heavy penalties for violation of prohibition. A special agent

in the internal revenue bureau will probably be asked.

The first 36 states ratifying the amendment are: Mississippi, Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Maryland, Montana, Texas, Delaware, South Dakota, Massachusetts, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Florida, Michigan, Ohio, Oklahoma, Maine, Idaho, West Virginia, Washington, Tennessee, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, North Carolina, Alabama, Kansas, Oregon, Iowa, Colorado, New Hampshire, Utah, Nebraska.

Is Accomplished Fact

Claim that California could not yet be classed as in the dry column was not considered serious by Senator Sheppard, prohibition leader.

He said the California legislature had already ratified the dry amendment as required by the constitution, adding that California's ratification was now an accomplished fact.

Sheppard pointed out that the restraining order against the California governor was merely to prevent his signing the transmission of the report of ratification. This report, Sheppard held, was not even required by the constitution.

Dry Leaders Jubilant

Congressional dry leaders, informed by the United Press of the ratification by the thirty-sixth state, were jubilant. Representative Randall, California, and Senator Sheppard, Texas, leaders in the fight for the amendment, announced its ratification when house and senate met.

Sheppard and Randall planned to issue a statement later commenting on the result of their long fight for national prohibition.

The next step, they announced, will be preparation of a new code of laws to make prohibition effective. This will include new criminal statutes for punishing violators. Sheppard said developments of this code probably will have to await the arising of conditions induced by prohibition. He and other dry leaders, however, will prepare laws covering prohibition and will endeavor to have this passed by the time prohibition becomes effective a year from today.

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 16.—Approved applications for discharge of 8128 members of the Thirteenth division at Camp Lewis have passed through the office of Major W. G. Muller, division adjutant, in the last two days. This number represents 44.8 per cent of the men in the division.

BRAZIL'S PRESIDENT ELECT DIED TODAY

Was Elected In March But On Account Of Health Was Not Able To Assume Office.

Rio de Janeiro, Jan. 16.—Rodrigues Alves, president-elect of Brazil, who was never able to assume the duties of his office on account of illness, died at 1:40 today.

Vice President Deiphim Morcia, former governor of the Minas Geraes, succeeds to the presidency.

Alves was unanimously elected to the presidency last March but was unable to assume his office on November 15.

Alves previously served one term as president of Brazil—from 1902 to 1908. During that administration he gave evidence of being one of the best statesmen Brazil ever produced. He brought about the enactment of numerous public health measures and, besides improving the principal Brazilian ports, remodelled and virtually rebuilt the city of Rio de Janeiro.

Alves also strove at all times to bring a closer relationship between Brazil and the United States. He was regarded as the strongest friend of the United States and the foremost advocate of Pan-Americanism in South America.

OPPOSITION TO SKELTON.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Strong opposition to the re-appointment of John Skelton Williams as comptroller of the currency suddenly has evinced itself in the senate.

Republicans looking to success in the next presidential election do not enjoy the prospects of a democratic comptroller of the currency at the treasury. The comptroller's term is for five years.

SPARTACANS STILL FIGHT.

Copenhagen, Jan. 15.—Fighting was resumed in Berlin yesterday, dispatches from German sources reported today.

Spartacans fired into the streets from house tops, these advices say. Bombs were thrown upon a railroad station. Attacks were made on the Frarizer barracks. A brief engagement was fought in the Bellecampplatz, in which government troops were successful. The fighting continued all day.
