Senate Probers Say Ford Peace Expedition Was Inspired By Hun Interests

Washington, Jan. 22.—Henry Ford's famous peace expedition in the fall of 1915 to "get the boys out of the trenches by Christmas," was inspired by German and pacifist interests.

Stevenson has been connected with the military intelligence department and conducted a study of propaganda in New York.

"Rosika Schwimmer, an Austrian woman, first conceived the plan," said Stevenson. "She went over on the peace ship and never came back."

He also testified that Louis Lochner, Ford's secretary, and a number of other prominent persons involved in the plan, were interested in various pacifist societies.

Many professors with "radical and bolshevik sympathies," still hold places in American universities, Stevenson said.

Stevenson said he would submit a list for the committee. Of the many pacifist societies, one was organized after we got into the war and flourishes today, Stevenson declared.
