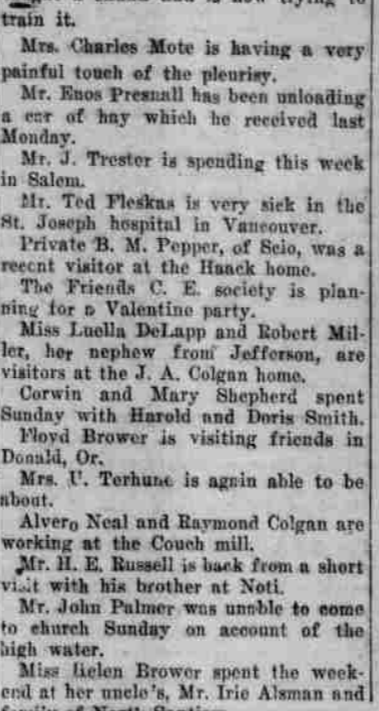
Mrs. Alfred Hunt of Mill City is visiting her sister Miss Saphrania Farnum and her mother.
